Community Profile: Eritrean Youth for Change (EYC), *Yonas Woldeab* yonwol@yahoo.com
Yonas Woldeab, (Water Resource Manger) – was granted asylum in the US in 2010 after completing university study in Germany. EYC helped him and now Yonas volunteers with EYC.
Yonas provided a very informative presentation including Eritrean history and geography as well as immigration push and pull factors and EYC services. The Eritrean population is 5 million with considerable amount of the population living abroad. Eritreans are the 3rd largest refugee community in east bay.

Eritrean immigration push factors include: Human rights violations, Restrictions/bans to religious freedom, lack of economic opportunities, mandatory military 1-2 year national service was extended to up to 15 years (since 1995). Many Eritrean immigrant youth in the US have left because of extended military service, often including detainment, torture, inhumane treatment.

Eritrean immigration pull factors include: Human rights, economic and educational opportunity, pressure to provide for family: go abroad to work and send back money. 1800 Eritrean are escaping monthly, 50,000 refugees were housed in camps in Ethiopia.

Common immigration routes are via Sudan (residing in refugee camps to apply for status), crossing desert, Libya, Mediterranean, many stops along the way to destination countries including Scandinavia, EU, US, Canada, Australia, Gulf States.

Bay Area: accurate population stats are unknown

Challenges for Eritreans in the Bay Area: social-cultural assimilation, language barrier, lack of economic and education opportunities, access to health services, basic legal orientation, fear of family persecution back home and on route. Any application for refugee or asylum status is considered a crime in Eritrea resulting in detainment and fines and puts family back home at risk. As a result of this fear, assistance is provided in secret because of possible informants.

Eritrean Youth for Change (EYC) started in 2008 as a result of shared experiences and the community assistance that was happening anyway. These activities became formalized through EYC, whose aim is to assist the Eritrean community and provide support to those recently immigrated to the US and specifically the Bay Area.

EYC Goals and Activities:

- EYC is voluntary based and has a goal to fund a paid position
- Monitoring sessions
- Interpreter services
- Court assistance
- Resume writing and job search assistance
- Aid to victims of human trafficking and those who are detained
- Organize fundraisers, seminars, cultural get together, demonstrations
- Push for constitutionalism in Eritrea
- Collecting data lack of statistics limits access to resources.

Expect more Eritreans to come to the Bay Area – the flora and climate feels like home!

EYC is an independent, non-profit and non-partisan civic organization founded in 2008 by Eritreans residing in the Bay Area. It aims to utilize all legitimate and peaceful measures of public empowerment and awareness to support and advocate for constitutionalism governance in Eritrea. In addition, EYC provides the necessary support and advocates on behalf of Eritrean immigrants especially those who have recently immigrated to the United States and more specifically to the Bay Area.
