Refugee Transitions (RT) Programs in SF - Grace Lau, Program Coordinator

- Serving refugee, asylee, and immigrant communities and students throughout the Bay Area. Goal to assist newcomer families in becoming self-sufficiency in the US by providing services to help them attain the English language, life, job, and academic skills they need to succeed in their new communities. Three program areas: Education, Family Engagement, Community Leadership.
- *SF Program for Adults*: English, Life Skills, Vocational Home-based Tutoring/Mentoring and Computer Classes, Family Support & Community Building, Leadership Development.
- SF Program for Youth: Home-based Tutoring, After-School Tutoring, Family Support & Community Building, Youth Leadership, Summer Camps, Early Childhood Development Program.
- RT partners with SF and Oakland International High Schools for after school and home-based tutoring for students in the country less than 4 years.
- Partner with Good Samaritan Family Resource Center for English classes. Childcare and development classes available. Call Good Sam for enrollment 415-401-4253
- Oakland classes also available. Contact Sandra at 510-761-1946.
- RT enrolling students in SF for Home-based Tutoring, English Language & Life Skills classes.
- See attached for referral info for Home-Based Tutoring. RT will contact interested students and explain the programs and plan to assess ESL level for matching with a tutor.
- Staff Spanish, Chinese, Burmese, Arabic language capacity.
- Student application available in multiple languages.
- RT has 250 new and returning volunteers who make a minimum 6-month commitment.
- Volunteers can apply online. New Volunteer Orientations are held every other month. A *new group of volunteers will be ready in February* to be matched so send referrals.

- OCEIA supports gathering of immigration services, and Language Access Ordinance policies. Ensure SF is a welcoming community to immigrants. Link between immigrant community and SF city services.
- Citizenship support with Pathways to Citizenship workshop free legal assistance.

- Connections to other immigration legal services. SF Immigrant Legal Defense Council attorney-of-the-day service.
- Challenges: Immigration and legal landscape changes constantly. People get bounced around to agencies. Need trusted providers.

Immigrant Support Hub website tool – direct support providers to assist immigrant communities to best legal referral.

- https://immigrants.sfgov.org/ Online tool to help people connect to free to low-cost immigration legal help in SF. Results are agencies that the city funds. No private attorneys.
- "Find Help" button to answer 4 initial questions for customized results. Filter by language.
- Citizenship eligibility, deportation counseling, Rapid Response hotline info for Bay Area counties.
- Results are sorted alphabetically. May be waitlists due to high demand.
- Contact OCEIA for any immigrant immigration services.
- The OCEIA team can come to your site to review with your staff.
- The unsigned leaked executive order has caused fear to access social services. Legal advice/General Immigration Screening is important in the changing immigration climate.

Announcements, Events:

- Jadma Noronha, Tahirih Justice Center providing legal immigration services for victims of gender-based violence. Bay Area office opened in 2016. 100 clients, often referred by other agencies. Asylum cases, T and U-visas, VAWA. No waitlist. Staff are available to come to your agency for service overview. Office is in San Bruno, across from BART station. Serve all of Bay Area. Policy Department addressing barriers at national level.
- **Victor Magallanes, Arriba Juntos**, accepting referrals for new asylees, T-visa holders and other immigrants for ESL training program.
- Tony Tran, Family Caregiver Alliance; Funding for services for elderly and disabled. Focus is on caregiver support regardless of income. IHSS, respite, and support groups available. Low usage among Hispanic and API communities. Family consultant can do assessment. Qualifications:
 - Contract with legal consult for free or discount services. Tony is available to come to your agency to share info.
- Alex and Rachel, Partners for Trauma Recovery free mental health services in 20 language capacity. Address individual needs with trauma-informed lens. No limit on sessions. Open to all asylees and refugees who have suffered international human rights abuses.
- Cameo Taylor, JVS job skills and programs happening: Job Search Accelerator (monthly), paid Veterinary Assistant Apprenticeship (April 2018), CMA (March 2018), Tech Career (January 16). Eligibility: can work in the US and pass ESL level, SF residents. Flyers attached.
- Naomi Pease, American Red Cross' Restoring Links can help search for missing family members. Support for Families of missing migrants in disaster area and crossing southern border.
